INSTRUCTION NOTES TO THE PROXY NOTICE

Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha Hounslow ("The Charity")

- 1 As a Gurdwara member, you are entitled to appoint a proxy to exercise all or any of your rights to attend, speak and vote at a General Meeting of the Charity. You can only appoint a proxy using the procedures set out in these notes.
- 2 Appointment of a proxy does not preclude you from attending the meeting and voting in person. If you have appointed a proxy and attend the meeting in person, your proxy appointment will automatically be terminated.
- 3 A proxy does need to be a member of the Charity but must attend the meeting to represent you. To appoint as your proxy a person other than the Chair of the meeting, insert their full name where indicated. If you sign and return this proxy notice with no name inserted, the Chair of the meeting will be deemed to be your proxy. Where you appoint as your proxy someone other than the Chair, you are responsible for ensuring that they attend the meeting and are aware of your voting intentions. If you wish your proxy to make any comments on your behalf, you will need to appoint someone other than the Chair and give them the relevant instructions directly.
- 4 To direct your proxy on how to vote on the resolutions, your proxy may vote (or abstain from voting) as he or she thinks fit in relation to the limited range of additional resolutions which may be put before the meeting. These include for example:
 - 4.1 resolutions to deal with procedural aspects of the meeting such as the calling of a poll or a decision to adjourn,
 - 4.2 resolutions proposing amendments to the resolutions listed in the notice of the meeting, but note, the circumstances in which amendments can be made are very limited.
- 5 To appoint a proxy, this notice must be:
 - 5.1 completed and signed by you.
 - 5.2 sent electronically to khalsa@sgss.org or handed over to the General Secretary/Office and
 - 5.3 received by the Charity no later than 24 hours in advance of the meeting.

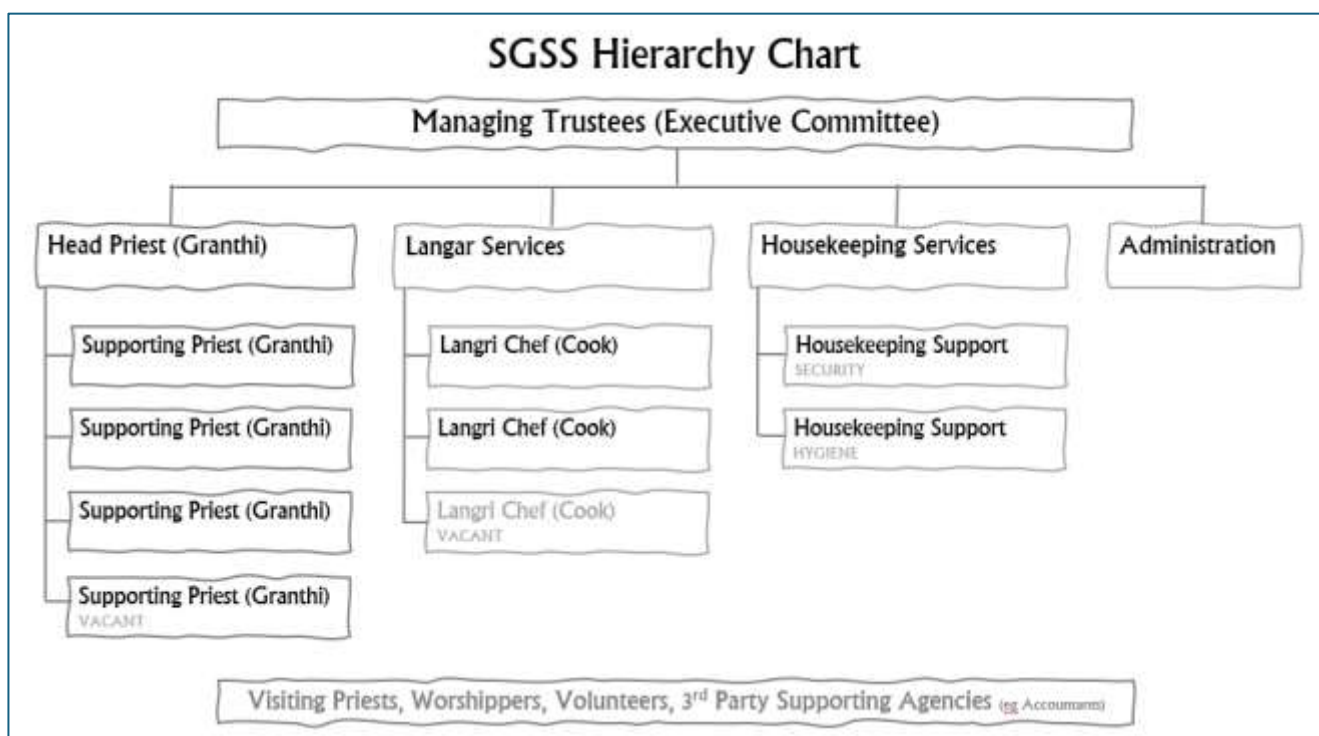

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

31ST MAY 2026

General

1. This Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha Annual Report briefly covers the period from 1st April 2025 to 31st March 2026
2. The Report provides an overview and reflects the contributions from many Sewadars who have diligently supported the Trustees through their dedicated Seva. The Management Trustees have encouraged and welcomed the ongoing youth engagement in the services being provided by the Gurdwara.
3. Many successes have been achieved through adaptation by recognising and promoting the Gurdwara as, more than a place of worship, particularly through the continuous development and improvement of past initiatives to meet community's religious, educational, cultural, welfare and social needs.
4. To ensure worshippers received appropriate service when visiting the Gurdwara - and that conduct was in accordance with the *Sikh Rehat Maryada* (Sikh Code of Conduct).
5. A summary of the activities and services available at Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha to meet the Constitutional Aims, are listed at Annex A.
6. Following the upgrade of underfloor heating and installation of a new Lift last year, further infrastructure investments have been committed to the much required Main Kitchen renovation and Air Conditioning of key areas.
7. The Main Kitchen has been refurbished with a dedicated Cold Room and freezer accessible from the Kitchen.
8. Two additional Digital Golaks have been installed with one outside the new building Darbar Sahib and the other outside the Langar Hall in the Main Building.
9. Much progress has been made on the administrative aspects of the Gurdwara to meet mandatory requirements to operate as a Charity, i.e. workable Operational Handbook along with several procedures to ensure accountability, e.g. AML (anti money laundering), Safeguarding, Complaints procedures – This led to 14 written suggestions and 6 complaints being made which have all been addressed.
10. Our operational model to deliver the Gurdwara objectives is illustrated below:



Religious

11. Amrit Sanchar was held at Guru Nanak's Gurburab and Vaisakhi at the Gurdwara Sahib; 13 sangat members were baptised on Vaisakhi day.
12. Religious functions continue to be based on the Nanak Shahi Calendar, and this year we arranged an Akhand Path to mark the Nanak Shahi Sikh New Year.
13. Guru Nanak Dev Ji's Gurburb, along with other recognised Gurburabs were celebrated with various visiting jathas paying tribute.
14. Younger members of the sangat continue to perform kirtan every Sunday; they are encouraged to participate in other religious functions externally as well.
15. The 'Youth Engagement Scheme' (YES) organised by the sangat, also manage other youth activities including Simran at 4:00am, Katha in English, evening Rehras and langar continues to gain popularity, attracting youth locally and from surrounding areas.
16. Istri Sabha Sat Sangh takes place every Tuesday where the ladies lead the services – reading Sukhmani Sahib path followed by kirtan until 2:00pm.
17. We continue to host and support 'fixed-date Gurburabs' (Nanak Shahi calendar) dialogue nationally and on a global platform.
18. The events (Jan-Dec 2025) organised by the Gurdwara are summarised >>.

Education

19. A summary of Gurdwara Education Programme is set out at Annex B.
20. Over 300 students attend Panjabi Classes, starting age being 6years, leading to adults. It leads to GCSE and 'A levels. Most of our students obtained A and A* grades.
21. Kirtan classes are gaining popularity with student numbers on the increase. Separate classes are held twice a week, for learning to correctly read and recite Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji.
22. Use of Gurdwara library continues to grow with current membership exceeding 500.
23. Local and national English newspapers, UK and Indian printed Panjabi newspapers are provided.
24. Summer Camp remains a popular event for the parents and children which is always oversubscribed due to the quality of activities and the staff interaction.
25. We remain supporters of Hemkund 'Public speaking' competition which develops confidence and knowledge of Sikhi amongst our youth; due to the generosity of our local sangat members, we look forward to sponsoring some of the champions to much high levels.
26. Over 50 school visits were accommodated with over 2,000 students and teachers benefiting. It was particularly encouraging to note that in addition to local schools, there were visits from northern, western and southern counties of UK and the continent. They had been attracted by the quality of service and talk by the Gurdwara guides.
27. Through various visits, meetings, seminars and lectures, Gurdwara has continued to increase awareness and Sikh uniformity and practices.
28. Interaction with external bodies to deliver the Gurdwara objectives included renown scholars like Dr Asma Qadri, Dr Gurnam Singh, Dr Hardial S Dhillon, Dr Christine Moliner



delivering talks on subjects varying from Japji Sahib to Migrations in Panjab to Sikhi & Universe.

29. 50 individuals have taken advantage of the Computer classes over the past few years. The demand for this service is growing.
30. The unsupported Windows 10 PCs were taken out of service and recycled 10 refurbished Windows all PCs have been purchased to replace the obsolete PCs. As part of this upgrade each of the Classrooms now has a dedicated PC, connected to the overhead projectors, for use during lessons.

Welfare – Social, Culture and Safeguarding

31. Gurdwara's Sikh Assisted Marriage Service has continued to grow, with an average of over 500 registered members per month, taking advantage of the facility.
32. The Annual 8K Sponsored Walk is scheduled to be held on 26th July with funds raised for Gurdwara's many voluntary services.
33. Health awareness sessions held as and when availability of hosts to benefit sangat members - Diabetes UK, British Heart Foundation, Stroke Foundation, Hounslow PCT, Hounslow Public Health and Age Concern being in attendance. The aim is to promote healthy living, healthy eating and exercise. Through various NHS agencies, further regular health awareness sessions continue to be held at the Gurdwara including regular vaccination clinics.
34. Local Ward Councillors meet sangat members at 10:00am every 3rd Sunday of the month.
35. Coach trips continue to be organized for the Sangat's benefit, including day trip to Chattri Memorial (where 53 Indian soldiers who fought for the British Empire were cremated during the First World War).
36. The work of the Chaplaincy Team has been commended by the Hospital and Prison service.
37. Visits from elderly patients in nursing care were accommodated through DNH (Disability Network Hounslow).
38. Active engagement with Hounslow & Westminster Friends of Faith – providing support as necessary to harmonise societies.
39. Weekly classes in gatka and Taekwondo martial arts and Chair Yoga are held at Gurdwara.
40. A regular 'Monthly Dialogue' programme has been rolled out with world renown speakers on Sikh related discussions.
41. Bimonthly workshops on Bullying and Grooming of vulnerable adults and school children are held along with Self Defence classes.



Humanitarianism

42. Disability Network Hounslow continues to hold weekly surgery at the Gurdwara every Friday from 10.00am to 4.00pm.
43. Gurdwara Head Granthi visits Immigration Removal Centre every Thursday – conducting religious services and providing pastoral care to the detainees.
44. The Wellbeing's strong Chaplaincy team now has regular presence at local Hospitals, Care Homes, Hospices, Detention Centre, Prisons, Colleges and the Airport.
45. The Cost of Living crisis has affected wider community. Sri Guru Singh Sabha Gurdwara has provided support to the communities with support workshops and is recognized as a safe place of warmth for those needing support. We have extended this to include the supply of frozen meals (Rice, Sabzi & Dall) to local food banks as well as hot meals to other vulnerable elderly members of the community.

Estate and Maintenance

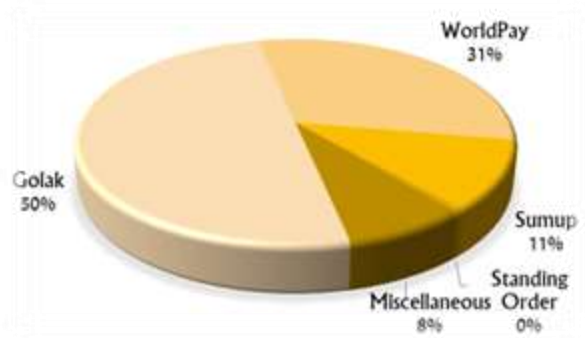
46. Along with the capacity to collect donations via various online platforms, we have an income stream from our rental properties.
47. Current Gurdwara estate is made up of the following properties, all within the London Borough of Hounslow:
- * 2A Parkside Road Freehold
 - * 27 Hibernia Road Freehold
 - * 29 Hibernia Road Leasehold Downstairs Flat #
 - * 33 Hibernia Road Leasehold Upstairs Flat
 - * 35 Hibernia Road Freehold – completion due imminently
 - * 231 Hanworth Road Freehold
 - * 233 Hanworth Road Freehold
 - * 235 Hanworth Road Freehold
- # Freehold on 29 & 31 – completion due imminent
48. Over the Covid shutdown, many of our estate’s service providers were unable to provide on-site support, pushing our infrastructure into a disrepair condition. All maintenance has been reviewed, and major works are in progress to maintain the Gurdwara infrastructure. These works include:
- Lift replacement in the main building.
 - Renovation of the Main kitchen
 - Upgrade of New Hall kitchen
 - Air conditioning in progress
 - Washroom facilities
 - Landscaping
 - Safety & Security
- Further investigations into identifying newer cost effective solutions are also being explored.

Accounts

49. To meet Charity Commission requirements, Accounts for 2024/2025 have been published (see summary below); 2025/26 are being audited by the Gurdwara Accountants which should be available in the Autumn to be submitted.

52. We supported Camberley Gurdwara with a loan of £200k to acquire the site. The Loan was fully repaid in December 2025.
53. We support and donate towards appeals promoting Panjabi, Sikh human rights and humanitarian appeals.
54. The Gurdwara also made donations Khalsa Aid in support of the Punjab Flood Relief Appeal.
55. The Gurdwara also made donations to the Pingalwara Charitable Society UK and BSCF (British Sikh Consultive Forum).

56. Maintain and grow Members and Sangat attendance in the Durbars.
57. Motivate youths to be innovative to organise and deliver projects & workshops.
58. Continue to implement and empower Sewadars.
59. Continue the successful engagement of more multi-lingual Kathakars and Ragi Jathas.
60. To support other complimenting bodies to spread Guru Nanak's teachings.
61. Ongoing Fixed Date Calendar confusion.
62. Implement consistent Estate maintenance practices.

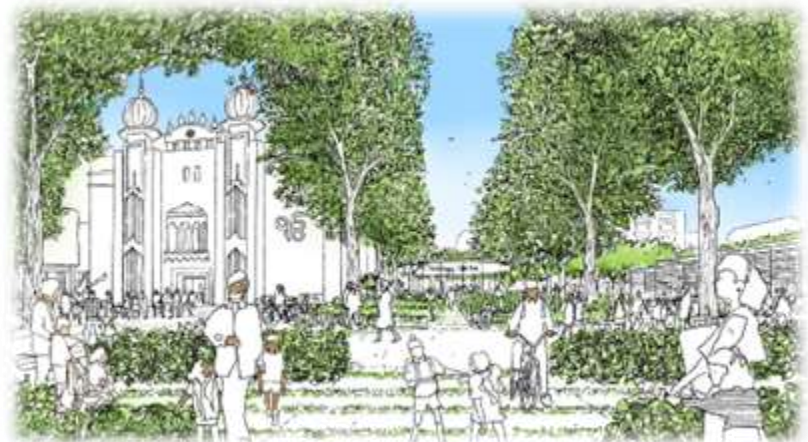
Gurdwara Adjoining Land : 209-213 Hanworth Road

The adjoining land (209-213 Hanworth Road) had been used by the Gurdwara as an overflow carpark since 2003. The landlord (Dept for Education – DfE) made an application to build a SEN (Special Education Needs) school with 124 residential units during Covid shutdown. This was contested vigorously by the Gurdwara and the neighbouring partners.

Our prayers were heard and with Waheguru's Kirpa, the proposed development was 'paused' in late 2025. The landlord (DfE) and the developer A2D, both withdrew all plans to develop the land.

We met the DfE representatives last month when they indicated that they are awaiting confirmation of any further interest from within the Education or Health departments who may be able to use part or whole of the land. If there is poor response, we will be in a position to propose our plans and make a bid for the site.

The Gurdwara thanks you all sincerely for the support you have given in the past years, and we look forward to your continued support for us to successfully secure the site.
