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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31st March 2015

The Trustees of Gurdwara Sri Guru Sabha present their Annual Report for the year ended 31 March 2015 under the Charities Act 2011 (Accounts and Report) Regulations 2008, together with the audited financial statements for the year.

Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha Annual Report covers the events, happenings and functions from 1st April 2014 to 31st March 2015. The Report reflects events that benefited not only the Gurdwara's congregation but also the local community at large.

It must be mentioned that great care is taken to ensure services be delivered, with Sikh perspective in mind, guided by Sri Guru Granth Sahib (Eternal Sikh Guru) and Sikh Rehat Maryada (Sikh Code of Conduct) as published by the Dharam Parchar Committee of Shromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (Amritsar).

In all Gurdwara activities, we try to ensure that the sanctity of the Gurdwara Sahib is not in any way sacrificed or compromised.

The report shows that the delivery of a range of services was only made possible by the effort of a wide range of volunteers, who devote their precious time, energy and expertise. It reflects the positive Gurdwara environment that helps volunteers deliver services successfully.

Sikh Guru Sahiban established the Gurdwara as an institution which in addition to being a place of worship also fulfils the educational, social, cultural and welfare needs benefitting not only the Sikhs, but also the community at large.

To ensure the maintenance of high standard and consistency in service delivery at the Gurdwara, various informal appraisal sessions were held with volunteers and Granthi's.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

All trustees are volunteers and have necessary skills to contribute to management and development of Gurdwara. Members of executive committee (Main trustees) are elected every 3 year in AGM held in May.

New trustees are trained and introduced to duties by previous or other members of executive committee.

Induction and training of new trustees

Most of trustees are experienced businessmen and professionals and already familiar with practical work of Gurdwara. New trustees are provided training and induction as required.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

There are two types of trustees:

- a) Holding Trustees who holds the assets of the trust but have no other power and take no part in running the organisation.
- b) Main trustees (Executive Committee): they are responsible for day to day running of Gurdwara Trust and they decide the policies for running the Trust. All trustees are responsible to general body of members and are elected by them. Every year the trustees present the report to general body of members about the activities and problems facing the charity.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. Trustees believe that maintaining resources at current level will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse condition.

Trustees introduced formal written policies and clear authorisation and approval procedures to establish proper control and provide reasonable assurance to the public that major risks have been adequately managed. Wherever is appropriate, risks are covered by insurance.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and Aims

The objectives of the charity are to advance the Sikh religion in accordance with the teachings of Sri Guru Granth Sahib. In furtherance of that object but not otherwise, the charity may:

- (a) establish one or more centres for religious worship and ancillary educational and cultural activities; and
- (b) establish an adequate library with books connected with the Sikh religion and or educational matters in Punjabi, English and other languages.

Religious

The usual three daily prayers sessions have been held every day with little variation at the weekend, when the place is humming with other activities such as marriages, engagements, birthdays etc

This year Vaisakhi Nagar Kirtan was held on Sunday 29th March 2015. As in the past, the procession was headed by the Guru Granth Sahib in a float followed by the sangat singing sacred hymns. The event was held in conjunction with Gurdwara Nishkam Sewak Jatha in Martindale Road. The procession had a short break at Martindale Road Gurdwara Sahib. As usual this was an epic event.

Vaisakhi Day was celebrated on Tuesday 14th April 2015 with whole day again dedicated to kirtan / katha, with a break for Nishaan Sahib Sewa at 11.00am, which was carried out under the auspicious presence of Panj Pyaray. Gurdwara youths sang "Deh Shiva" shabad on completion of the Nishaan Sahib sewa.

Amrit Sanchar is held on every Vaisakhi day at the Gurdwara Sahib.

Religous functions continue to be based on the Nanakshahi Calendar which had been introduced by Sri Akal Takhat at Amritsar in 2003. Although the Shromani Committee have reverted back to the old system, Hounslow Gurdwara Sahib continue to follow Nanakshahi calendar.

Holla Mohalla the historic Sikh festival was introduced by Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji at Anand Pur Sahib in 1701. This martial art tradition has been adopted by the Gurdwara youth who presented a fantastic show of Gatka mock fight which was repeated again at the end of the Nagar Kirtan and lasted about an hour.

Guru Nanak's birthday which was on November 6th 2014 last year was another eventful day. Bhog of Sri Akhand Path Sahib was followed by a day of kirtan and religious discourse. The event lasted the whole day with various visiting jathas paying tribute to the Master - Founder, eulogising mercy of the lord towards the down trodden.

Akhand Paths and Sehaj Paths totalling 109 together with 221 Sukhmani Sahib Paath and kirtan were conducted, both at home and at the Gurdwara.

There were 132 weddings and engagements conducted and 75 funerals, 52 school visits took place.1 kavbi darbar was held, 4 trips were organised to the seaside. There were two meetings on inter-faith marriages and SriSrii Hem Kunt Centre Society speech competition took place.

Gurdwara youths had continued to perform kirtan from 10am to 11am during every Sunday service programme at the Gurdwara.

Furthermore, Gurdwara youths are encouraged to participate in every religious anniversary function by including them in the days programme with an hour slot, during which they performed kirtan (learnt at the Gurdwara's kirtan classes).

Istri Sat Sangh continued every Tuesday at 11.00am, where the ladies lead the services, reading Sukhmani Sahib Path followed by kirtan till 2.00pm.

Education

Over 370 students attend Panjabi Classes, with starting age being 6 leading to classes for adults. Panjabi education leads to GCSE and 'A' levels. There is an adult Panjabi class on Friday evenings for those who wish to learn Panjabi.

2014 Panjabi exam results. 'A' Level final 3 passed. 'A/S' Level 7 passed, GCSE '14' passed

Teachers continued to be subject to annual written contracts.

CRB checks had become a prerequisite for contractual working with children, which is required in order to meet legal obligations.

Over 100 students continued to attend regular kirtan classes.

In partnership with West Thames College (Isleworth), Adult English classes continue to be provided at the Gurdwara. The classes have been streamed into two groups, one being ready to take ESOL exams (entry level 1 and 2) while the second is for beginners and those requiring further attention..

Separate classes are held for learning to read recite and understand Gurbani. Adult classes are held on Monday 5-6pm and youth classes on 5-6pm and 6-7pm on Tuesday.

In view of the need for further education provision at all ages in the area the Gurdwara is situated, we have been continuing with our attempt to establish a Khalsa school under the Free School Scheme.

The Gurdwara library has been going through a reorganisation and a regular system of issues in being introduced. .

20th Annual Summer Camp was held at the Gurdwara over the first two weeks of the summer holidays, ensuring maximum number of students participating. The camp is for children aged between 6 and 13. The Committee would like to thank all the volunteers who make this happen.

Gurdwara's Annual Academic and Outstanding Activity Achievement Awards took place in September 2014, the awards being given in recognition for achieving exceptional academic results or in an outstanding activity.

Throughout the year various groups come to visit the Gurdwara and learn more about Sikhi. Apart from schools, we also have visits from the Army, Police, British Legion etc. all these groups are shown the Darbar hall, Langar hall, classrooms, library and exhibition hall and then invited to have langar.

52 school visits were accommodated with over 2800 students and teachers benefiting. The Gurdwara continued to attract school visits from the surrounding counties.

Liaison has been maintained with Hounslow Borough Police with formal invites to Police Commanders to join at Vaisakhi and Guru Nanak's Birthday celebrations.

Faith Liaison Officer from Hounslow Police Station continued to hold an hour long surgery at the Gurdwara every Tuesday, from 11am to noon.

Through visits, meetings, seminars and lectures, Gurdwara has continued to increase awareness about Sikh uniformity and practices.

Weekly classes in Gatka and Taekwondo martial arts held at Gurdwara.

The First Aid Training was held in March 2015 and to help gain experience they accompanied St John's Ambulance during Gurdwara Vaisakhi Nagar Kirtan.

Local Member of Parliament held monthly surgeries at the Gurdwara. We hope the new incoming MP for this area will keep up this tradition.

Gurdwara Sikh Assisted Marriage Service continues to flourish with over 350 registered members at any time.

The Gurdwara members supported and participated in a memorial service held on Sunday 18th June 2014 at the Chattri Memorial near Patcham in Brighton, for the Indian soldiers who were cremated in Brighton following their death from war wounds during the First World War. The Chattri memorial had been unveiled by the Prince of Wales in 1921.

The Gurdwara continues to accommodate UK Boarder Immigration Service (Home Office) surgeries at the

Gurdwara, from which many have benefitted in returning to their homeland. Importance of this free service is put into perspective on hearing the experience some of these vulnerable people have had to endure at the hands of solicitors, agents and employers.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Review

The Gurdwara is funded by donations from congregation and it is this income that funds the work of the charity. The net incoming resources for the year amounted to £287K and this was attributable to general reserves, which now stand at £5,180,710

Reserve Policy

The Trustees have adopted a reserve policy that they consider appropriate as that part of the Charity's funds that are freely available for its general purposes.

The charity has a reserve of £268K (2014: £268K) in deposit account which represents 55% of annual expenditure on charitable activities. The bank and cash account balance was £69K as at 31st March 2015 (2014: £37K).

Our policy is to continue building up our reserve to the ideal level by means of annual operating surpluses in addition to general appeals to the public.

Investment Policy and Objectives

The main trustees (Executive Committee) have power for acquisition and disposal of assets. They act like Board of Directors and are responsible for all activities of the trust. Decision on acquisition and disposal of assets are taken unanimously and no individual trustee can take any decision on his own.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31st March 2015

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, the Charities Act 2011 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - No depreciation provided
Library Books - No depreciation provided
Fixture, Fittings & Equipments - 15% on reducing balance
Motor vehicles - 25% on reducing balance

For Freehold properties no depreciation is provided in respect of freehold land and buildings. The Charity has a policy of regular maintenance and repair, so that the asset maintains its performance standards. The assets are not expected to to suffer from economic or technological obsolescence and the estimated residual values are material. An impairment review is carried out annually at the end of the accounting period where no depreciation is charged as it is deemed immaterial because the differences between carrying value and market value of the freehold properties are insignificant.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
