Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31st March 2011

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

All trustees are volunteers and have necessary skills to contribute to management and development of Gurdwara. Members of executive committee (Main trustees) are elected every 3 year in AGM held every year in May.

New trustees are trained and introduced to duties by previous or other members of executive committee.

Organisational structure

There are two types of trustees:

- a) Holding Trustees who holds the assets of the trust but have no other power and take no part in running the organisation.
- b) Main trustees (Executive Committee): they are responsible for day to day running of Gurdwara Trust and they decide the policies for running the Trust. All trustees are responsible to general body of members and are elected by them. Every year the trustees present the report to general body of members about the activities and problems facing the charity.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. Trustees introduced formal written policies and clear authorisation and approval procedures to establish proper control and provide reasonable assurance to the public that major risks have been adequately managed. Where appropriate, risks are covered by insurance.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity are to advance the Sikh religion in accordance with the teachings of Sri Guru Granth Sahib. In furtherance of that object but not otherwise, the charity may:

- (a) establish one or more centres for religious worship and ancillary educational and cultural activities; and
- (b) establish an adequate library with books connected with the Sikh religion and or educational matters in Punjabi, English and other languages.

Annual Vaisakhi Nagar Kirtan was held on Sunday 4th April 2010 and the police estimated that about 8,000 participated in the event. Vaisakhi Day was celebrated on Wednesday 14th April with whole day again dedicated to kirtan / katha, with a break for Nishaan Sahib sewa at 11.00am, which was carried out under the auspicious presence of Panj Pyaray. Gurdwara youths sang "Deh Shiva" shabad on completion of the Nishaan Sahib sewa.

The historic annual Holla Mahalla festival, introduced by Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji at Anandpur Sahib in 1701, was marked at the Gurdwara on 20th March 2011 with religious services followed by Gatka performance by the Gurdwara Gatka class students.

As in previous years, Gurdwara Youths managed the Gurdwara on Sunday 25th July 2010, gaining valuable experience in delivering Gurdwara Sunday services, with encouragement to take responsibility for voluntary activities and Granthi duties.

Akhand Paaths and Sehaj Paaths totalling 84 together with 142 Sukhmani Sahib Paaths were conducted, both at home and Gurdwara.

On Sunday 19th December 2010, the 84 Paath class students successfully completed their reading of final shabads from Sri Guru Granth Sahib, when there was collective participation of students. Following the reading of final shabads and the subsequent Sehaj Paath bhog all the 84 students, ranging in age from teens to some over the age of 80, were presented with awards in recognition for their Paath success.

Gurdwara youths had continued to perform kirtan from 10am to 11am during the regular Sunday service programme.

On first Sunday of each month, from 11am to 12pm, Gurdwara youths also conducted kirtan with support, presentations and lectures in English. Additionally, youth kirtan darbar in English took place on the last Friday of each month, from 6.00pm to 8.00pm, where the Gurdwara youths also had responsibility for conducting Rehraas Paath, Ardass and Vaak.

Furthermore, Gurdwara youths were encouraged to participate in every annual religious function by their inclusion in the whole day plan for kirtan and katha programme. In major events the youths were always entrusted with stewarding responsibilities.

Istri Sat Sangh continued every Tuesday at 11.00am, where the ladies led the services, reading Sikhmani Sahib Paath followed by kirtan till 2.00pm.

Education

All aspects of education is now under "Head of Education" and there has been better coordination between different education provisions.

Charitable activities

Teachers continued to be subject to written contracts. This has obviously improved on reliability and effectiveness.

CRB checks had become a prerequisite for contractual working with children, which is required in order to meet legal obligations. Meanwhile the Vetting and Barring had been put on hold following direction from the Government, as the process was to be reviewed.

Over 100 students continued to attend regular kirtan classes. In partnership with West Thames College (Isleworth), Adult English classes continue to be provided at the Gurdwara. The classes had been streamed, one being ready to take ESOL tests while other group needed a longer period.

Sign Language Classes to teach communication skills to enable talks with a deaf person, both by finger spelling and signs was introduced at the Gurdwara. The service was provided through support from Disability Network Hounslow and led by BSL (British Sign Language) Deaf Group.

Initiative taken to establish "Khalsa Primary School Hounslow" under the Government's free school scheme. In this respect it was also decided that a separate Trust be set up to manage the school, with Gurdwara facilitating.

16th Annual Summer Camp was held at the Gurdwara over two weeks from Monday 26th July to Friday 6th August 2010, with each child attending one of the two weeks, which enabled maximum student enrolment. Gurdwara young volunteers again rose to the challenge of planning and delivering the event and which was again a great success.

For the first time, Gurdwara with the support of Baba Fateh Singh Gatka Akhera (BFS), a successful Gatka Camp was held at the Gurdwara from Monday 23rd to Thursday 26th August 2010.

Gurdwara's Annual Academic and Outstanding Activity Achievement Awards took place on Sunday 26th September 2010, the presentations being made by Balbir Singh Kamal, a prominent researcher and writer. The awards made were in recognition for achieving exceptional academic results or in outstanding activity.

A mentoring seminar was held at the Gurdwara on Sunday 29th August 2010. The aim of this initiative was to help build confidence and positive outlook, whether reacting to results, starting academic studies, preparing for university life or to compete for employment.

Annual pocket diaries and table diaries for 2011, based on Nanakshahi calendar, were produced and distributed amongst the congregation. A calendar for 2011 was also produced by the Gurdwara, the theme being Sikh kings and Generals during the Khalsa Raj.

Gurdwara library was opened for use at specified hours. Local and national English newspapers and Panjabi newspapers provided. Update of Gurdwara web-site (www.sgss.org) is in progress.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

48 school visits were accommodated with over 3,000 students and teachers benefiting. It was noticeable that amongst these there were schools from northern, midland and southern counties, Wales, Scotland and Europe. Visits from elderly patients, accompanied by their nurses or carers, were also accommodated.

3 groups of new recruits assigned to Hounslow Borough Police were brought to the Gurdwara to receive a brief induction into Sikh Faith and its practice, the Code of Conduct and the significance of 5 K's.

Issues relating to the wearing of Kara and Kirpan for Sikhs, particularly for Sikhs in security sensitive areas like Airports, were raised with the appropriate bodies through BSCF, All Party Parliamentary Group for Panjabi's in Britain and local MP's.

Through visits, meetings, seminars and lectures, Gurdwara has continued to increase awareness about Sikh uniformity and practices. As part of increasing awareness about Sikh Faith and practice, visits were hosted for Prison Service, Trainee Teachers, RE students, SERCO staff and other local bodies.

Gurdwara participated in "Festival of Ideas" week held by University of Cambridge from 20th to 31st December 2010, this being the main interface of the University with the wider local community.

Exhibition "Sikhs in World Wars" was opened on Thursday 8th April 2010 at the Gurdwara by Hawaldar Rajinder Singh Dhatt, an Army veteran who had served in the British army during the Second World War. The exhibits had been put together with the help of Imperial War Museum and covered Sikh contributions in both the first and Second World Wars. On Friday 9th April 2010 Imperial War Museum held an interactive for Sikh youths at Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha.

Gurdwara youths and volunteers visited House of Commons on Thursday 19th August 2010, where they received a conducted tour of the Parliament.

On Sunday 26th December 2010 an overview presentation on Sikh Raj coins was given which was followed by a display to last until 9th January 2011 of unique collection of Sikh Raj coins at the Gurdwara.

Weekly classes in gatka and taekawondo martial arts held at Gurdwara. 3 football teams continued to be sponsored by the Gurdwara.

Welfare & Social

Gurdwara has continued to give support to All-Party Parliamentary Group (Panjabis in Britain), on Panjabi and Sikh related issues. Arrangements made for local Member of Parliament to hold monthly surgeries at the Gurdwara.

Gurdwara Sikh Assisted Marriage Service continue to flourish with over 450 registered members at any time.

Gurdwara continued to liaise with Hounslow Race Equality Council on race matters. Gurdwara continues to be Third Party Reporting Centre.

Gurdwara also continued to maintain affiliations with the following:

- a. Network of Interfaith for the UK.
- b. Local Ethnic Minorities Consultative Group
- c. Hounslow Voluntary Sector Forum
- d. Network of Sikh Organisations
- e. Hounslow Interfaith Group
- f. Women's Interfaith Group
- g. British Sikh Consultative Forum
- h. Disability Network Hounslow

On Sunday 12th September 2010, Gurdwara's 21st Annual Gurdwara 10km Sponsored Walk was held and which was kindly opened by Rajinder Singh Dhatt, a World War 2 veteran. This annual event helps to raise funds for many worthy causes which Gurdwara supports through contributions.

Through various NHS agencies health awareness sessions continued to be provided at the Gurdwara. Healthy Lifestyle Roadshow was held at the Gurdwara on Sunday 20th February 2011. During the roadshow free health checks were available for Blood Pressure and Blood Glucose, Cholesterol, Body Mass Index, Carbon Monoxide, Advice given included issues relating healthy eating, oral health, health support group and on getting the right advice.

Army Career Advice Service continued to be available at the Gurdwara on Tuesdays every two weeks.

61. Military Sikh Chaplain Seminar was held at the Gurdwara on Thursday 11th November 2010 (with break at 11am to observe Remembrance Day) which was attended by the most senior military personnel's and by Sikh members from the three military services. The aim of the seminar, to inform the senior military officers about the Sikh Faith, practice and code of conduct to observe, was achieved.

Weekly free finance advice was introduced. This followed congregation members concern about the confusing advice on finance matters given out in the media

UK Boarder Agency (Home Office) surgeries at the Gurdwara were very successful with many taking advantage. In addition, International Organisation for Migration (IOM) were usually present to provide advice to those who wished to return back to their homeland.

Coach outings for the Gurdwara congregations were arranged for trips to seasides and other Gurdwaras or historic places. Gurdwara performed 96 Anand Karaj ceremonies at the Gurdwara.

Humanitarianism

Gurdwara sponsorship of free eye camps in Panjab continues. With the support and cooperation of Guru Nanak Mission Hospital Trust in Jallandhar the following camps were held during the year:

Statistical details from the two eye camps mentioned above(all provided free to camp attendees) is as follows:

1300 eye patients were seen

200 cataract operations performed

651 received prescription glasses

658 received medical check up

During the free eye camps the following services were also provided:

- a. Medical check-up and Breast cancer screening
- b. Awareness about the perils of alcohol and drug abuse
- c. Advice about self check for early identification of breast cancer

Due to the success of the camps the budget for each camp has had to be revised to £3.5k.

Disability Network Hounslow continues to hold weekly surgery. A joint Disability Network Hounslow and Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha Akhand Paath was held at the Gurdwara from 21st to 23rd June 2010, with prayers said for people with disabilities, including for community members with physical, sensory, learning, mental health or hidden disabilities. Over 2,500 people attended during the three days. In addition, there were stalls by Link, Mulberry Centre, Fire Brigade, presentation by National Deaf Children's society, Stroke Association and Healthy Lifestyle Roadshow, while Consultant Cardiac Nurse specialist were present to answer any questions of concern.

As part of West Thames Hospital Chaplaincy Service Gurdwara Head Granthi remains on 24/7 call. Gurdwara Head Granthi visits Harmondsworth Detention Centre every week, taking Gurdwara langar for the inmates, while also providing advice and services and helping inmates to celebrate gurpurbs when due.

In response to Disaster Emergency Committee (DEC) Pakistan Floods Appeal, a sum of £1,500 was contributed by the Gurdwara.

31 funeral services held, catering for over 4,000 mourners.

Gurdwara Estate

Refurbishment of the toilet facilities in the main building had been undertaken.

CCTV system upgrade is continuing.

For added security main metal gates provided which are now locked each evening and reopened in early morning.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Review

We are pleased to report the net increase of £210,472 in funds for the year taking the accumulated unrestricted fund to £4,053,363.

Reserve Policy

We had a reserve of £206K in deposit account which represents 47% (2010: 34%) of annual expenditure on charitable activities. Our policy is to continue building up our reserve to the ideal level by means of annual operating surpluses in addition to general appeals to the public.

Investment policy and objectives

The main trustees (Executive Committee) have power for acquisition and disposal of assets. They act like Board of Directors and are responsible for all activities of the trust. Decision on acquisition and disposal of assets are taken unanimously and no individual trustee can take any decision on his own.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Charity does not anticipate any major change in its operations and expect to continue with its stated objectives and provide services and facilities to Sikh community and also increase its participation in the life of the local community.

However, Gurdwara has also planned to:

- Improve awareness about Health & Safety particularly within the langar working area.
- Provide further screens to enable those outside the prayer halls to follow services taking place.
- Empower youths to organise and deliver further projects.
- Hold discussion sessions with the youth.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31st March 2011

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Charities Act 1993 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Grants offcred subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property

Library Books

Fixture, Fittings & Equipments

Motor vehicles

- No depreciation provided

- 15% on reducing balance
- 25% on reducing balance

The trust has not depreciated its freehold property, and has therefore not complied with requirement of the Companies Act 2006 and FRSSE. The trustees however believe this is an appropriate policy as it gives a true and fair view of the charity's balance sheet as the differences between carrying value and market value of freehold properties are insignificant.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
