STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

All trustees are volunteers and have necessary skills to contribute to management and development of Gurdwara. Members of executive committee (Main trustees) are elected every 3 year in AGM held every year in May.

New trustees are trained and introduced to duties by previous or other members of executive committee.

Organisational structure

There are two types of trustees:

- a) Holding Trustees who holds the assets of the trust but have no other power and take no part in running the organisation.
- b) Main trustees (Executive Committee): they are responsible for day to day running of Gurdwara Trust and they decide the policies for running the Trust. All trustees are responsible to general body of members and are elected by them. Every year the trustees present the report to general body of members about the activities and problems facing the charity.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. Trustees introduced formal written policies and clear authorisation and approval procedures to establish proper control and provide reasonable assurance to the public that major risks have been adequately managed. Where appropriate, risks are covered by insurance.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity are to advance the Sikh religion in accordance with the teachings of Sri Guru Granth Sahib. In furtherance of that object but not otherwise, the charity may:

- (a) establish one or more centres for religious worship and ancillary educational and cultural activities; and
- (b) establish an adequate library with books connected with the Sikh religion and or educational matters in Punjabi, English and other languages.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCECharitable activities

Religious

Hounslow's 13th Annual Vaisakhi Nagar Kirtan was held on Sunday 3rd April 2011, with route remaining unchanged from that for 2010 and the police estimated that about 8,000 participated in the event. Vaisakhi Day was celebrated on Thursday 14th April with whole day again dedicated to kirtan / katha, with a break for Nishaan Sahib sewa at 11.00am, which was carried out under the auspicious presence of Panj Pyaray. Gurdwara youths sang "Deh Shiva" shabad on completion of the Nishaan Sahib sewa.

544th Nanakshahi Nerw Year was marked on Wednesday 14th March 2012.

The historic annual Holla Mahalla festival, introduced by Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji at Anandpur Sahib in 1701, fell on Friday 9th March 2012 and the event was marked with a Gatka performance by the Gurdwara Gatka class students on Sunday 11th March 2012.

Gurdwara Youths managed the Gurdwara on Sunday 25th July 2010, gaining valuable experience in delivering Gurdwara Sunday services, with encouragement to take responsibility for voluntary activities and Granthi duties.

On Sunday 15th Jan 2012, Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha Santhya students all collectively performed Paath Bhog, when they were also presented with certificates in recognition for their achievements. The students ranged from 12 to 80 years old.

Akhand Paaths and Sehaj Paaths totalling 111 together with 167 Sukhmani Sahib Paaths were conducted, both at home and Gurdwara In addition 27 kirtan functions were similarly conducted...

On Sunday 19th December 2010, the 84 Paath class students successfully completed their reading of final shabads from Sri Guru Granth Sahib, when there was collective participation of students. Following the reading of final shabads and the subsequent Sehaj Paath bhog all the 84 students, ranging in age from teens to some over the age of 80, were presented with awards in recognition for their Paath success.

Gurdwara youths had continued to perform kirtan from 10am to 11am during the regular Sunday service programme.

On first Sunday of each month, Gurdwara youths also continued to conducted kirtan with support, presentations and lectures in English. Additionally, youth kirtan darbar in English took place on the last Friday of each month, from 6.00pm to 8.00pm, where the Gurdwara youths were responsible for conducting Rehraas Paath, Ardass and Vaak.

Furthermore, Gurdwara youths received an hour slot during every annual religious function thus encouraging them to participate through conducting kirtan learnt at Gurdwara kirtan classes. In major events the youths were always entrusted with stewarding responsibilities.

Charitable activities

Istri Sat Sangh continued every Tuesday at 11.00am, where the ladies led the services, reading Sikhmani Sahib Paath followed by kirtan till 2.00pm.

Education

Improvements continued following education aspect at the Gurdwara being reorganised under "Head of Education" giving better coordination between different education provisions. Teachers continued to be subject to written contracts. This has obviously improved on reliability and effectiveness. CRB checks had become a prerequisite for contractual working with children, which is required in order to meet legal obligations.

Over 100 students continued to attend regular kirtan classes. In partnership with West Thames College (Isleworth), Adult English classes continue to be provided at the Gurdwara. The classes had been streamed into two groups, one being ready to take ESOL exams while the second was for beginners and those requiring further attention.

The plans for the establishment "Khalsa Primary School Hounslow" had to be redrawn as the original concept was with location for the school on the TFL site along the Gurdwara Eastern perimeter boundary, the site having been sold by TFL subject to the proposed purchasers receiving planning permission.

Interest in learning to read, recite and understand Sri Guru Granth Sahib Gurbani continued to grow. To meet the growing demand additional classes have been put in place, particularly to accommodate Gurdwara youths who can only attend these classes after school in the evenings.

17th Annual Summer Camp was held at the Gurdwara over two weeks, 25th July - 5th August 2011, ensuring maximum number of students participating. Gurdwara young volunteers were again empowered to plan and deliver the camp project. Police, Army and firemen joined the empowered youths to help run planned activities.

A Discussion Group was introduced, meeting on Sundays once a month when there are presentations from a Sikh perspective on a specific topic of interest leading to mature discussions.

Gurdwara with the support of Baba Fateh Singh Gatka Akhera (BFS), held its 2nd Gatka Camp at the Gurdwara, a 4 day event from Monday 15th to Thursday 18th August 2011.

Gurdwara's Annual Academic and Outstanding Activity Achievement Awards took place on Sunay 25th September 2011, the awards being made in recognition for achieving exceptional academic results or in outstanding activity.

In keeping with the Gurdwara tradition of previous years, Gurdwara Youths managed the Gurdwara on Sunday 24th July 2011, gaining valuable experience in delivering Gurdwara Sunday services, with encouragement to take responsibility for voluntary activities and Granthi duties.

Mentoring services were made available for the young to help build their confidence and positive outlook.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities

On Friday 5th August 2011, Gurdwara youths visited Buckingham Palace as the guests of Buckingham Palace Royal Household. During their visit they received a conducted tour of State Rooms at the Palace which was followed by a reception.

Young volunteers who assisted during the summer camp were treated to a conducted tour of Houses of Parliament on Wednesday 24th August 2011.

The Archbishop of Canterbury visited the Gurdwara on Tuesday 18th October 2011, when he addressed a multi faith audience on "The spiritual and social benefits of dialogue between Sikhs and Christians". This was followed by question answer session.

Annual pocket diaries and table diaries for 2012, based on Nanakshahi calendar, were produced and distributed amongst the congregation. With Olympics due in London in 2012, a calendar for 2012 was also produced by the Gurdwara, the theme being "The Sikh Olympians & Internationals".

Following reorganisation of the Gurdwara library, achieved with the help of a team of dedicated volunteers, there has been much improvement in opening hours and its usage, particularly by the young.

Following major improvements to the Gurdwara website (www.sgss.org) it was relaunched in January 2012.

53 school visits were accommodated with over 3,500 students and teachers benefiting. Gurdwara continued to attract school visits from northern, midland and southern counties, Wales, Scotland and Europe. Visits from elderly patients, accompanied by their nurses or carers, were also accommodated.

Police Officers assigned to Hounslow Borough Police were encouraged to visit the Gurdwara to receive a brief induction into Sikh Faith and its practice, the Code of Conduct and the significance of 5 K's. Police liaison maintained with Hounslow Borough Police and Richmond Borough Police.

In August 2011, during the London riots, police officers from other forces helping to police Hounslow streets were welcomed to the Gurdwara for langar and refreshments and on behalf of the Hounslow residents were formally thanked for their help.

Issues relating to the wearing of Kara and Kirpan for Sikhs, particularly for Sikhs in security sensitive areas like Airports continued to be raised with the appropriate bodies through BSCF, All Party Parliamentary Group for Panjabi's in Britain and local MP's.

Through visits, meetings, seminars and lectures, Gurdwara has continued to increase awareness about Sikh uniformity and practices.

As part of increasing awareness about Sikh Faith and practice, visits were hosted for Prison Service, Trainee Teachers, RE students, SERCO staff and other local bodies.

Charitable activities

Part of the exhibition "The Golden Temple of Amritsar: Reflections of the Past" which was first held in Brunei Gallery at SOAS and later in Home Office in Whitehall was subsequently brought to the Gurdwara.

Weekly classes in gatka and taekawondo martial arts held at Gurdwara. 3 football teams continued to be sponsored by the Gurdwara

Welfare & Social

Gurdwara Have continued to give support to All-Party Parliamentary Group (Panjabis in Britain), on Panjabi and Sikh related issues.

In recognition for receiving his peerage and becoming the first turban wearing Sikh to have such honour, Gurdwara presented Dr Indarjit Singh with a saropa and appropriate plaque on Sunday 18th December 2011.

Gurdwara continued to liaise with Hounslow Race Equality Council on race matters. Gurdwara continues to be Third Party Reporting Centre.

On Sunday 17th July 2011, Gurdwara's 22nd Annual 10km Sponsored Walk was held and which was kindly opened by distinguished world centurion marathon runner S Fauja Singh, who holds many senior world records for marathon running. The sponsored walk participants who met the qualification criteria were presented with awards at the Gurdwara on Sunday 30th October 2011.

Through various NHS agencies and LBH, health awareness sessions continued to be provided at the Gurdwara. Healthy Lifestyle Roadshow was held at the Gurdwara on Sunday 20th April 2011. This is an annual Gurdwara activity to help increase awareness about healthy living and dietary controls to avoid diseases common among South East Asians, a group to which the Sikh community belongs.

Charitable activities

On Sunday 8th January 2012 Gurdwara Wellbeing Centre Project was launched at the Gurdwara and a team of dedicated volunteers had undergone training at the Civic Centre under the auspices of London Borough of Hounslow (LBH). Wellbeing Centre has been setting their stall in the Gurdwara foyer every Sunday from 11am to 2pm. Arrangements have also been put in place to call upon a specialist once such need had been identified.

On Thursday 26th January 2012 in conjunction with the London Borough of Hounslow "Healthy Walk" project was launched at the Gurdwara which was to encourage regular walks for members of the congregation. Since the launch regular walks have been taking place from the Gurdwara every Thursday at 10.00am.

First Aid training was held at the Gurdwara on Wednesday 21st March 2012 and 20 Gurdwara volunteers successfully completed the course. The training was provided by Sarah Dale who is Community Resuscitation Training Officer for London Ambulance Service and the British Heart Foundation. Those who completed the First Aid training assisted above joined the St John's Ambulance members during the 2012 Vaisakhi Nagar Kirtan, thus gaining useful experience.

Local Member of Parliament continued to hold monthly surgeries at the Gurdwara.

Gurdwara Sikh Assisted Marriage Service continued to flourish with over 450 registered members at any time.

Regular Army Career Advice Service provided at the Gurdwara, ceased during the latter part of the 2011/12 financial year due to MOD cuts.

Following concern expressed by congregation members, free legal advice service was held at the Gurdwara on Sunday 19th June 2011 regarding Will making and Probate. In addition advice was given regarding property sale, purchase, property disputes and legal procedures that was effective in India and Punjab in particular.

Gurdwara supported and participated in a memorial service held on Sunday 12th June 2011 at the Chattri Memorial near Patcham in Brighton, for the Indian soldiers who were cremated in Brighton following their death from war wounds during the First World War. 2011 marked the 90th anniversary of the unveiling of the Chattri Memorial by the Prince of Wales in 1921.

Gurdwara continues to accommodate UK Boarder Agency (Home Office) surgeries at the Gurdwara, from which many have benefitted in returning back to their homeland. Importance of this free service is put into perspective on hearing the experience some of these vulnerable people have had to endure at the hands of solicitors, agents and employers.

Coach outings for Gurdwara congregations' benefit were arranged for trips to seasides and other Gurdwaras or historic places.

Gurdwara performed 110 Anand Karaj ceremonies at the Gurdwara.

Humanitarian Sponsorship

As part of the Gurdwara sponsorship of free eye camp programme which was launched in 2002, the 26th and 27th camps were held at VPO Singhpur on 2nd October and VPO Kalewal Fathu on Sunday 9th October. Some camp statistics are as follows:

During every Gurdwara sponsored free eye camp the following benefits are always provided.

Eye Camp: Eye check; Medical treatment; operations; Dark glasses; transport to & from hospital; meals in hospital; prescription glasses; post operation monitoring

Medical: medical check; medication; X-ray; mammography; Ultra Scan; ECG; Laboratory checks & analysis; Radiography; minor operations; post operation monitoring.

Awareness about breast cancer self monitoring, and about drug and alcohol addiction and its impact is also provided.

Since 2002, the total numbers who have directly benefitted from the Gurdwara sponsored free eye camp programme include the following:

- 13, 750 eye patients have been seen by specialists
- 1, 982 cataract operations have been performed, while the rest of the eye patients received medical treatment or prescription glasses as appropriate
- 18 eye patients required and received minor eye surgery
- Patients for medical check-up received free medication as prescribed by the doctors while 4 diagnosed with early stage of breast cancer which were successfully treated through medication

Disability Network Hounslow continues to hold a weekly surgery every Friday (2.00pm - 4.30pm).

As part of West Thames Hospital Chaplaincy Service Gurdwara Head Granthi remains on 24/7 call.

Charitable activities

Gurdwara Head Granthi visits Immigration Removal Centre (IRC) at Harmondsworth every Wednesday, taking Gurdwara langar to feed over 100 inmates, while also helping to conduct religious services and giving advice on their need to remain calm and responsible. With the support and cooperation of the Centre's Chaplaincy Service management, Gurdwara provides special services and langar during annual Sikh religious functions.

Gurdwara has continued to support and donate in response to humanitarian appeals.

67 funeral services held, catering for over 10,000 mourners.

Gurdwara Estate

CCTV system upgrade is continuing.

There has been improved security with the better usage of main metal gates, particularly with the timely closure of both the main gate in Alice Way the Gurdwara gate on the Hibernia Road.

The acquisition of the Leasehold property at 29 Hibernia Road was completed on 26 April 2011. Gurdwara paid the sum of £166k for the purchase of this property.

Gurdwara attempted to acquire the TFL site lying along the Gurdwara eastern perimeter boundary with an offer of £6.1m. Unfortunately developers made higher offers with TFL accepting an offer of £12m which however is subject to the developer receiving planning permission.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Review

We are pleased to report the net increase of £261,332 (2011: £210,721) in funds for the year taking the accumulated unrestricted fund to £4,314,695.

Reserve Policy

We had a reserve of £186K (2011: £206K) in deposit account which represents 43% of annual expenditure on charitable activities. We have to mention that £166K paid for a new flat from charity's own resources.

Our policy is to continue building up our reserve to the ideal level by means of annual operating surpluses in addition to general appeals to the public.

Investment policy and objectives

The main trustees (Executive Committee) have power for acquisition and disposal of assets. They act like Board of Directors and are responsible for all activities of the trust. Decision on acquisition and disposal of assets are taken unanimously and no individual trustee can take any decision on his own.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Charity does not anticipate any major change in its operations and expect to continue with its stated objectives and provide services and facilities to Sikh community and also increase its participation in the life of the local community.

However, Gurdwara has also planned to:

- Improve awareness about Health & Safety particularly within the langar working area.
- Improve working environment and safety for the volunteers working in the langar area.
- Provide further screens to enable those outside the prayer halls to follow services taking place.
- Empower youths to organise and deliver further projects.
- Hold further discussion sessions with the youth.

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31st March 2012

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Charities Act 1993 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property

- No depreciation provided

Library Books

- No depreciation provided

Fixture, Fittings & Equipments

- 15% on reducing balance

Motor vehicles

- 25% on reducing balance

The trust has not depreciated its freehold property, and has therefore not complied with requirement of the Companies Act 2006 and FRSSE. The trustees however believe this is an appropriate policy as it gives a true and fair view of the charity's balance sheet as the differences between carrying value and market value of freehold properties are insignificant.

Tayation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
